A benefit of being a judge is you will be motivated to learn more about your specific model(s) and you will definitely be a more informed Jaguar owner.

Please let Chief Judge Jack Humphrey know if you are interested.

As an introduction to Concours judging, Jack will conduct a Concours Preparation Seminar and a judge's training class on Saturday, May 2nd. These classes will be held at Jaguar Colorado Springs and will follow the timeline shown below.

10:00 AM - 12:00 AM - Judge Book Review (Break / Meeting Room)

12:00 AM – 12:30 PM – Lunch (Break / Meeting Room)

12:30 PM – 1:00 PM – Testing (Break / Meeting Room)

1:00 PM – 3:00 PM – Model Orientation / Practice Judging (Service Bay)

If you are already a Judge, a refresher training class is mandatory per JCNA regulations. The JCSC offers the above class on May 2 or additional classes are offered by the Rocky Mountain Jaguar Club. You can check their website for dates and times.

Registration Now Open for 2015 Spring Dust-Off

Take the cover off the Cat, check its vital signs, gas it up and come join us for the annual Dust-Off on Sunday, May 17, for a fun and eventful way to welcome the 2015 summer driving season. This year's tour will begin in Castle Pines where we will meet in the parking lot of the DazBog Coffee shop at Castle Pines Parkway and Lagae Rd. (Exit 188 off I-25 and 0.5 miles west)

Meeting time will be 8:30 a.m., with a driver's meeting at 9:00, and on the road by 9:15 to 9:30 a.m. We will drive down Daniels Park Rd., making our way to Sedalia where we will pick up CO 105 and skirt the foothills as we drive south through Palmer Lake and Monument crossing over I-25 on Baptist Road into El Paso County where we will continue east until we reach Fox Run Regional Park.

We will meet up again under a reserved covered park pavilion to sip champagne and juice, munch on strawberries and other snacks, and trade stories of the fabulous scenery. Expect the drive to the park to take about one hour and 15 minutes. We will take an approximate one hour break in the park to allow everyone enough time to enjoy the scenery, use facilities, and get ready for the second part of the drive.

From the park, we will take about one hour to make our way back north, partly through the Black Forest, and then using CO 83 heading toward Parker. We will arrive at the superb new car museum, The Vehicle Vault, in time to enjoy a catered box lunch in our private dining room on the second floor and tour the 45-car museum under the tutelage of the cars' owners (all cars in the museum are owned by one couple, the Dilleys.) Total drive time is about two hours and 15 minutes, total elapsed time to the Vehicle Vault will be just over three hours, and we will cover about 85 miles.

JAGUAR 420 GRAND SALOON



My sainted father was a motor head, and like many sons I followed in his footsteps. I recall he was driving to visit me in Boulder when his brand-new International Travelall lunched a rod. He limped into the Denver Jag dealer, and I barely recognized him and his Stetson Open Road when he pulled up in a gorgeous new burgundy with burgundy leather 1967 E-type series 1 ½ coupe, the wire wheels gleaming. I'll always remember the exhaust note. He loved this car so much the next year he bought a new 420G from Owen Faricy.

As many of you know, the 420 G (4.2 liters; "Grand Saloon") was evolved from the Mark X, with more trim and a larger engine. These are the biggest regular sedans made by Jaguar at Coventry, excluding the stretch Pullmans (limousines), especially in width. The full complement Jaguar big straight six with its cams, three big carbs, 9:1 and no emission equipment, making about 250BHP, down low in its range. Front suspension and brakes are virtually the same as the E type. The rear is independent as well with inboard discs. The steering is quite light, and the gearing seems low, begging for another gear.

This car with a 4 speed with electric overdrive instead of the lazy three speed BW would be an amazing automobile, indeed, and chasing 7-series would be a pastime. The handling is very smooth and surprisingly quick, flat and kind. The interior is all Circasean walnut veneers, Wilton wool headliner and carpets, Connolly leather, with a front small desk and lovely picnic tables with vanity mirrors in the back. Legroom is like a London cab. The boot is very large as well, with the huge Rolls Royce AC unit just behind the rear seats. The tool kit is a delight and an envy to others. The swoopy, sharky shape speaks for itself.

In retirement, Dad took a couple of trips to the Northwest where he was from, but mostly drove it around town – to the bank or the El Paso Club to lunch with his cronies. He loved to punch it and feel all that torque. He took friends around to graduations and weddings, all ooing and ahing at this gorgeous automobile. He always put fresh yellow roses in the Waterford crystal bud vases on the B pillars, identical to the ones the Queen required in her own Daimler version of the Mk X.

After his death, the big sedan languished in my mother's garage for years. I started it now and then,



but it wasn't enough and it deteriorated. It was leaking all vital fluids. I was involved in the vagaries of life and in restoring a 1965 Porsche 356 SC cab, and after that time had a couple of well-known local shops attempt to work on the Jaguar but the jobs were not up to par. It only has 35K miles, but hard ones from sitting.



I gained interest again after meeting Col. Jack Humphrey who encouraged me to press on. The first job was a new headliner of British wool beautifully installed by Joe Knowles at his shop. What a difference as the original was very ratty. The carpets and leather were in quite good shape, although some of the wood near the vent windows had lost finish and was beautifully re-done by the artists at the Piano Warehouse downtown. There is no rust in the car.

Mechanical problems persisted, but the motor and transmission were sound. I brought the car to Mark Weiner of Concours Cars who did a detailed evaluation with recommendations about what he felt was needed. There, I found the expertise and interest this car needed, and we proceeded to do a lot of work, including a stainless steel exhaust, sparkplug wires (this is a pretty big deal), carburetor synchronization and adjustment, adjust the steering box (glad a new one wasn't needed), spin-on oil filter which cured a significant oil leak, re-seal the differential, a new cooling fan clutch to hopefully prevent over-heating, adjusted the bonnet and boot latches, repaired the running and backup lights, match and align headlamps, and too many other tasks to list here.

The car is running superbly, as it always should have save for my neglect, but we are not done yet. To follow is replacing all rubber window and door gaskets, again by Joe Knowles, rebuilding the front end and getting the AC to work. The seats and carpets are good but need to be washed. The very last and most daunting task will be to re-paint the car its beautiful Sable color, at a level it deserves. Space, pace, and grace, indeed. And elegance.

As for me, the beneficiary of all the gears and grease, I had a great time. Now a retired doctor, I can say it began early riding in my dad's souped-up patrol car, him being a sheriff's detective at one time. I think he was always a hot-rodder. I started with go carts, and I'll boast that I was the western regional cham-peen, ages 12 and 13, with two McCoullough MC6s blowing my ears out at 19K RPM. One of the reasons I'm pretty deaf today. Love the odor of methanol and castor oil.

I'm a homeboy and along with my kids and the ones in the cemetery there are 6 generations in Colorado Springs. St Mary's high school, CU Boulder, CU Med, KU med, USAF flight surgeon with TAC (fighter planes were perfect for my speed craziness), and the private practice of family medicine. I'm missing some parts of practice in my retirement, but have too many hobbies to list them here.

Mv first car was a '29 Model A Ford Cabriolet with Corvette running gear. Sixteen years old. Lucky to be alive. He got me my own '67 series 11/2 E-type roadster, red with black. I added Webers, headers, D-type cams, Abarth. It was sold to us at a very low price by an embezzler, the FBI told us later, but they didn't make me sell the car. Couldn't catch the 7 litre Ferrari Super America on the road to Boulder. 160 on those skinny, thin tires. Lucky to be alive. Dad worked hard for the money and indulged me, as you can see, but I worked hard in turn to make him proud. There was an early MG B which might have been the most fun of all.

Then an Alfa 1750 Berlina sedan which I loved. A wonderful car but tender, loving to beat up on 2002 tii BMWs and 356s. Restored a lovely 280 SL and that triple black '65 356 SC cab. A great car, but better in LA where it lives now with the new owner. Raced the carts, desert enduro with Husky (anybody remember the 360 with an automatic transmission?), KTM, but hurt myself on the



road on a Ducati Monster. Still lucky and living. SCCA class H, formula Ford, Bondurant. I'm way slowed-down now, and am content with my very old Audi 4000S Quattro, the old A6 Allroad wagon, and the beautiful 420G. Looking forward to all those JCSC drives, and I'll be also looking for passengers to pull down those gorgeous picnic tables for a small repast and perhaps some refreshment.

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
